HONR 3331.01 (Summer I): Culture and Society - The History of Now (CRN 41132) **ONLINE** J. Littleiohn The online seminar will focus on recent books, articles, podcasts, and films that explore personal narratives about life in America today. Students will be asked to engage with and respond to various texts on class, race, and gender identity.

HONR 3331.02 (Summer II): Culture and Society - Future of Work (CRN 41133) **ONLINE** P. Lewis A university trains students in the fundamentals of a discipline rather than in the details of a particular job. In this online seminar, you will research your desired positions to better understand the specific requirements, preparations, and skills they require. You will investigate important aspects of these positions, such as salaries, market demands, and geographic hotspots, in the context of rapid technological advancement and shifting societal values. For example, how is advanced AI expected to impact your desired job? Are hybrid and remote positions available, and what tools are recommended for success in these emerging spaces? How can emotional intelligence, effective communication, and other soft skills aid advancement, resiliency, and long-term job satisfaction? Participants will explore these and many other topics related to the future of work from both personal and societal perspectives.

HONR 3331.03 (Summer I): Culture and Society - Museums (CRN 42869) **ONLINE** R. Lewis It is a fundamental drive to collect and preserve one's culture and heritage, but what exactly is the purpose of a museum? Museums 101 will introduce students to the function of museums in society by examining the history and mission of museums. Students will learn the importance of using objects to tell culturally based stories to visitors. Students will also explore the reasons why primary documents and other source materials are vital to research and interpretation. The course presents the basics of administration, collections care, research, education, and exhibition. In addition, it will explore the relevancy of museums and their tactile collections in an increasingly digital and virtual world.

The course is primarily asynchronous, supported by **some synchronous learning activities**, including two full-class meetings (held via Zoom), four small group meetings (held via Zoom), and a full-day TEDxSHSU event at the SHSU main campus in Huntsville (held in person). HONR 3322.02: Journeys - Engagement (CRN 85694)

The SHSU motto is "A measure of a life is its service." This Honors Seminar will expand the student's appreciation and understanding of how to go beyond service and to engage with our community. Students will learn the theoretical framework of engaged learning, the various forms of community engagement, and the tools to harness the life-long benefits of experiential learning. This team-taught course will provide students with several different community engagement perspectives and opportunities. Students will venture beyond the university classroom to engage with the local community partners in a mutually beneficial educational experience. It is hoped that students will emerge from the class with an enhanced sense of place and an appreciation of cultural humanity.

HONR 3331.01: Culture and Society - Kung Fu (CRN 81057)

In this course, we look at the history and culture surrounding Kung Fu. We will study its portrayal in the movies and popular culture. Students will learn the anatomy of Kung Fu and the muscles and mechanics behind it. Students should be prepared to do activities with controlled physical contact (Kung Fu drills and basic self-defense exercises), although no fighting will take place in the class. Martial arts attire is not required, but students must wear flexible clothing in which they can move freely. Students who demonstrate the required techniques and knowledge will earn a Yellow Belt in Kung Fu San Soo at the end of the course.

HONR 3331.02: Culture and Society - Healthcare Soft Skills (CRN 86438) **ONLINE D.** Berry

This course focuses on essential soft skills for new hires in the healthcare industry, ensuring they can communicate effectively, collaborate with teams, and provide compassionate patient care. Participants will develop strong interpersonal skills, including active listening, empathy, and cultural competence, to enhance patient interactions. Time management and organizational skills are highlighted to help employees balance responsibilities efficiently. By the end of the course, participants will be equipped with the key soft skills necessary for success in their healthcare careers.

HONR 3365.01: Decision Making (CRN 86441)

Latina/o/x art is also deeply rooted in the college experience where students are exposed to cultural, academic, and community engagement opportunities.
